

LOHMAN AREA CEMETERIES

As you approach Lohman, coming from the east just before you cross Clear Creek Bridge, there is a grave located up on the hill to the south, as the crow flies, possibly a walking mile. The grave at one time had a wooden marker that documented the name, age and date of birth. The wooden marker was removed for safe keeping and has never been returned. At one time, the grave had a post around it but has not been maintained.

MAIN, LILLIAN AGE 7 yrs. 8 mos. 11 days AUGUST 1889

1090 Death Certificate # ANDREW S. LOHMAN born Dec 7, 1857 in Shullsburg, Wisconsin to Andrew Lohman and Catherine Conway. Andrew married Lillian Martens (or Marlen) in Butte, Montana and they had two daughters, Lillian and Mary. Mr. Lohman died **October 7 1930** and was buried **October 12, 1930** with 500 people present at their home; burial was behind the Lohman house just off the sun porch where he could view the Milk River Country. Granddaughter, Loretta Charolette (German) James visited with Vernelia (Shankle) Tilleman, who grew up in Lohman, and stated there had been a mark on the fence showing where he was buried, but the fence eventually fell down.

BUNKER GRAVES

These graves are located on BLM land that was the Arthur Bunker homestead in the W2 of Sec 30, T34N, R18E. The Frantic Yantic Garden Club had a pipe fence built by Walt Paulson to protect and enclose the graves sometime in 1960.
